



# Once in a Lifetime... did you have your Awesome looking glasses?

How many times have we said to ourselves "This is once in a Lifetime? We are constantly telling ourselves "this is it, there will never be another one like it," but how many of us really listen to what we know is the truth? On Monday August 21, 2017, it was one of those times. Did you watch the Solar Eclipse? The Moon moved in front of the sun blocking it's light. All of North America was treated to this eclipse of the Sun. Anyone within the path of totality could have seen one of nature's most awe-inspiring sights. The Moon covered the Sun! Observers outside this path were still able to see a partial eclipse.

When I first heard about this astronomical event happening, I thought to myself "I remember the last time this happened. I've been through that before." As we get older we take it for granted that these kinds of events happen all the time. We tell ourselves that it is "just a part of nature." When we rationalize life we can down play the value of events like these. We can think about how there were 4 eclipses this year. 2 were solar and 2 were lunar. Do you do this? This is an example of our human nature taking over and allowing us to miss out. We are constantly weighing and judging, analyzing and calculating how valuable each moment is worth. As we continue on this path of Nembutsu as entangled egotistic beings, sometimes I ask myself "what are we doing?"

On Monday, August 21, 2017 we here at the temple came to have our regular 9:30AM service. Before we began I ask if we could finish a chanted a little quicker than usual so that we could finish service early. This would allow us all to take advantage of what was happening outside. Are we bad Buddhist for rushing service? Of course not. Jodo Shinshu is not practice based. The message for this day was what we come to temple to show our appreciation for Amida's Nembutsu which allows us to live our everyday lives and not be totally perfect. With this knowledge that our birth is assured, there are times that we should not pass up the opportunity to share the rare memorable moments in this life together.

#### "If there are persons who, having hear the Name of that Buddha, leap and dance with joy and say it even once, know that they receive the great benefit; that is, they acquire the unexcelled virtues." -Shinran (Notes on Once Calling and Many Calling)

When I read this passage and looked out upon those in attendance, I knew that this was a chance for our human selves to live and enjoy life. The Name of the Buddha, Namo Amida Butsu allows us all to not feel guilty for not practicing. It also allows us to realize that by being in service could cause us to miss something special. The Buddha's teaching remind us to not squander the solar eclipse, but to treat it as if it were our last. The next total solar eclipse over North America will be April 8, 2024 (a wonderful way to celebrate Shakyamuni Buddha's birthday.)

It is easy to miss out on the valuable lessons that are right in front of us and guide us. We cannot experience everything, but we can try and treat each moment as "once in a lifetime." Then say Namo Amida Butsu for helping us to realize something so valuable and meaningful. Gassho.

# **Planning for the Future**

Back in 2010, during the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Venice Hongwanji Buddhist Temple, a Long Range Planning project was conducted to look after our temple's long term health. A lot of time and effort went into the project, resulting in five goals which encompassed areas of religious education, financial stability, strengthening ties with temple organizations, and membership growth. Most importantly, the temple's mission statement, which I mentioned in the last issue of the Gassho, was created, acting as a guide for future activities of the temple.

Earlier this year, the temple board decided it would be worth re-examining the goals from seven years ago to see if they are still relevant, or if new goals should be established. After several months of deliberations by our Long Range Planning committee, the following three goals were provisionally adopted at our last board meeting:

# Goal 1: Encourage understanding of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism by offering, enhancing and integrating religious teachings into Temple activities.

I've recently been sensing a desire from individuals for a better understanding of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism. We've been having good discussions during the Dharma School adult class, and the attendance at our first *Introduction to Buddhism* class last spring exceeded our expectations. The first goal, then, will be an attempt to provide more educational opportunities to help fill that need, and to also make the teachings of Jodo Shinshu more accessible.

# Goal 2: Express compassionate values of Jodo Shinshu Buddhism by actively engaging in community service.

During a recent Dharma School adult class, Richard Modiano, our Minister's Assistant, recounted how Rev. Taitetsu Unno, when asked what his practice was as a Jodo Shinshu Buddhist, replied that his practice was compassion. And I've heard from various individuals within our sangha that we should be more actively engaged with the broader community outside of our temple. This second goal, then, addresses that need, to break out of our insular and isolated shell and express our compassion.

# Goal 3: Foster a safe, secure and all-embracing environment for everyone.

We want to make sure that everyone who visits or joins our temple (and/or our temple organizations) feel that they can meet in an environment that is warm and welcoming, regardless of their religious affiliation, age, gender, sexual orientation, etc.

The goals have been crafted to invite a wide range of group and individual involvement. We are not mandating that everyone in our temple take part in these goals. Our hope, however, is that groups or individuals within our temple will be encouraged to take the initiative in suggesting, organizing, and/or participating in activities related to these goals.

As I mentioned earlier, the goals have been provisionally adopted by the temple board, and for the next couple of months, we are soliciting feedback from our sangha, as well as the members from each temple organization. My feeling for those who actively embrace these goals: the goals will not only make you a better Buddhist, but a better person. Isn't that what we want from our temple? For everyone who comes to be a better person.

VHBT Remembers Adopted Vietnam War Killed in Action Written by Diane Belli

On May 27, members of the Temple participated in the annual Memorial Day Service for all Japanese Americans (JA) who gave their lives in the nation's wars. This service was held adjacent to the Japanese American National War Memorial Court.

In 2009, the VHBT Board voted to participate in the JA Vietnam War Killed in Action (KIA) adoption program.

"I was 19 years old when I went into the Army and I spent my 20th birthday in Vietnam." These words are from Temple member, Danny Nakagiri, who represented the Japanese American Vietnam War Veterans at the Memorial Service.

The young men who were adopted by VHBT were:

- Edward M. Amato, SP4 of Commack, NY, who was 23 years old when he was killed.

- Bruce J. Mori, Pfc of Los Angeles, CA, who was 20 years old when he was killed.

- Masashi Nakashimo S/Sgt of Santa Barbara, CA, who was 23 years old when he was killed.

- Rockne Masayoshi Noguchi, Pfc of Honolulu, HI, who was 20 years old when he died.

- Terry Y Ogami, Cpl of Reedley, CA, who was 21 years old when he died.

-Takeshi Yabiku, Sp4 of Los Angeles, CA, who was 22 years old when he died.

-Naoto Yamashiro, Sp7 of Honolulu, HI, who was 43 years old when he died.

- Douglas Yuki, Sp4 of Altadena, CA, who was 22 when he was killed.

VHBT also honors these young men during our annual War Memorial Service, which will be held on Sunday, August 6, 2017.
