Have you ever...? As I get older, I find the knowledge that guides me sometimes has very little bearing on the inner person I have grown to be. I use the knowledge, and do the "right thing." I have the long term hopes that this person that strives so hard to be at peace truly will be that ideal of tranquility that we strive to be as Buddhas. Are you a parent? For me parenting isn't always kindness, compassion, and love first. Sometimes when parenting, I find that my initial response is anger and frustration then as I look within there are two individuals fighting. Within there is one older me holding the other child like me in a headlock with arms and legs

flailing madly to get unleashed. Both are not the ideal. Once realizing this, then the parent emerges and tries to logically navigate life's moments. Do you have those moments? I hope that you can hear and learn from this honest account of introspection. As a human being, I have always wrestled with impulse. Have you done the same? The impulsive person within wants what he wants.

The above passage is by Saichi Asahara a Myokonin or truly devout Jodo Shinshu Buddhist. Here Saichi expresses his true inner self. He also offers the perfect solution to our human desires and blind passions. Realizing the problems within and all he can do is say the name Namu Amida Butsu. What do you see when you say it? You would think that the calming nature changes us within and you might visualize yourself calm and serene. My greatest wish would be that I could be naturally peaceful within and of course the first instinctive response would be Buddha like. Calm, Kind, Full of Love. This can be true and I do not doubt that for some people it might. For me I have been saying Nembutsu all my life, but from my story it tells you something different. Shinran wrote:

Although I too am within Amida's grasp, blind passions obstruct my eyes and I cannot see [the light]; nevertheless, great compassion untiringly and constantly illumines me.

This means that it is not just saying Namu Amida Butsu that allows us to see, but Amida's great compassion that shows us our true self as an ignorant being. In my personal example above, there are two people that are both ignorant and immature fighting. Shinran and Saichi's passages explain together that the passion driven person even when truly devout is unable to squelch their inner desires alone. When we put our hands together, let us look within relax our self-efforts and be engulfed in Amida's light. As this feeling grows continue to walk hand in hand with Amida as your guiding role model in your everyday life. When you see the inner self see two working together. These two are you and Amida and every time you need Namu Amida Butsu allow it to bring deep meaning to your life. As I said before, the goal is to always and effortlessly respond to every situation with virtues of a Buddha, but it is rare. We must constantly do our best to be mindful of why the Buddha's influence extends to each of us, and as we do this let the Buddha's heart change your own. I want to end this with more of Shinran's writings.

Like the rivers entering the vast ocean, the foolish minds of good and evil Return to Amida's Vow of Wisdom, as they become one with the heart of Great Compassion.

President's Message

Happy New Year, everyone! I usually don't watch a lot of television (mostly just UCLA football and basketball), but I heard about a new show on PBS that caught my interest. The show is called, "We'll Meet Again," and it's hosted by Ann Curry. For those of you who don't know Ms. Curry, she was a former co-anchor on the Today show. And besides having a delicious sounding last name, she is also half Japanese. Anyway, this new show is about reuniting individuals who met under extraordinary circumstances. The motivation behind these meetings seems to be a strong desire to thank someone for helping them through an event. For example, the first episode featured a Japanese American woman who was searching for a first-grade classmate who stood up for her during the racially charged beginnings of World War II. In each show, the searchers all express a deep feeling of gratitude to someone who's had made a significant impact on their life.

The reason why the show resonates with me is that one of the topics that I've learned through my limited time with Jodo Shinshu is the concept of gratitude. I remember many Dharma messages from different ministers on the subject. Our past resident minister, Rev. John Iwohara, liked to talk about our busy LA traffic (which is timely since Los Angeles has been ranked as having the highest traffic congestion for the sixth straight year). He would say that instead of being angry at all of the traffic, try being grateful that someone helped pour the concrete to create the freeway, and someone else painted the lines, and another person had to come up with traffic rules, and isn't it wonderful that to go somewhere, all we need to do is get into a climate controlled box, sit in a comfortable seat, with some nice music playing, and we can go just about anywhere we want. Or Rev. Kenji Akahoshi, from the Buddhist Temple of San Diego, talking about how gratitude is the difference between "please" (asking for something) and "thank you" (being grateful for what you have).

One of the more memorable Dharma messages, though, was one from Rinban Bill Briones of the Los Angeles Betsuin, who quoted this poem by Melody Beattie:

Gratitude unlocks the fullness of life.

It turns what we have into enough, and more.

It turns denial into acceptance,

chaos to order, confusion to clarity.

It can turn a meal into a feast,

a house into a home, a stranger into a friend.

Gratitude makes sense of your past, brings peace for today,

and creates a vision for tomorrow.

I'm going to end this rather long article with a "thank you" (although there's an implicit "please" in here as well). By the time you read this newsletter, you will have received, or you will soon receive, your temple membership letter and form in the mail. To those who have supported the temple in the past, going back almost sixty years, we thank you for your dedication, and for making it possible for future generations to have a place where we can come together. To those of you who renew your membership for the coming year, I thank you for your on-going financial contribution to the temple. The grant check was presented by Makoto Kotani, Program Associate with Keiro, to a group including several of the Senior Outreach members as well as Agustin, his infant daughter Isidora, and Temple President Ron Gee.
