Sersei's message

The body of Amida is in color like a mountain of gold;
The radiance of his features and marks illumines the ten quarters;
Only people of the nembutsu are grasped by the light;
Know that the Primal Vow is the decisive cause.

Hello Everyone,

The phrase above is from Shinran Shonin's third chapter of the KyoGyoShinSho on Shinjin. When I think of this passage I reflect on the journey of our life and how the teachings change us through introspection of our actions.

Let me share a personal experience. Recently, I met a person who has been deemed untrustworthy. My first reaction was to think to myself, "this person should not be allowed at the temple." I spent a day thinking about this person.

The next day as I was watering the trees in front of our temple, I thought to myself, "Why do I do this?" The answer to this has always been to physically spark the seeds of Enlightenment within others. This, of course, is not through my efforts, but to share the light of Amida Buddha. The passage is to help us on our personal journey. Amida's gold light of purity is constantly connected to us wherever we may go. Amida's Primal Vow or promise is for everyone. Only those that realize the value of the Vow or understand that this is the Buddha's Light are grasped. Being grasped sparks a grateful life with Nembutsu in their hearts. I can only say you have to figure this out for yourself.

Again, while watering the trees I realized something. My initial reaction to the untrustworthy person was wrong. In the eyes of a Buddha, human beings are all flawed. How would we react to a child who makes mistakes? We would not shut our doors to them, but think of strategies for them to discover the value of Amida Buddha's great compassion. I hope we would be honest and set up a system for the children to participate while supervised. For adults, limited time and supervision seems wise. This is not an easy answer.

It is complicated and would require a lot of patience, but I do have the hope that through the temple life and teachings of the Buddha

we would lay the groundwork for a process of change for everyone that comes through the door. More importantly, it would help us to change. Everyone is a future Buddha and all it takes is for us to take a step in another direction.

This is a reflection in progress. It was sparked by my own flawed reaction to meeting someone new and the thought of how I would handle it if they were to visit the temple. Buddhism teaches us that people can release their past and change in an instant. There are no easy answers and each situation is different. I ask for your help and support. We have to be rooted in the teachings, seeing people for who they are and what they can be. In fostering and sharing the heart of Nembustu, I have to remind myself that it is Amida's light and effort that accepts us. We are all hindered to different degrees. When we look at our decisions and actions how do they align with our basic teaching? The Buddha's efforts and gold light embraces all sentient beings.

Memorial Day Service

At the December 4, 2009, Board meeting of the Venice Hongwanji Buddhist Temple (VHBT), it was determined that VHBT would participate in the Japanese American Vietnam War Killed in Action (KIA) adoption program by "adopting" the names of 8-12 KIA and honor and remember them. The first time VHBT participated in the Memorial Day Service at the Japanese American National War Memorial Court was in 2010. Each year since 2010, members of VHBT have attended this special Memorial Day Service at the Memorial Court located at the Japanese American Cultural and Community Center (JACCC) and placed floral tributes to the seven (7) KIA adopted by the Temple. Present at the 2025 Service were Rev. Kory Quon; Temple President Tommy Nakagiri, who also did a floral tribute for the Vietnam War KIA Adoption Program; Dianne and Joe Belli; Phyllis Hayashibara; Ayako Masada; Danny and Cheryl Nakagiri; Kay and Keith Obana, Mari Tamura, and Morgan Gee.

According to the website of the Memorial Court Alliance, the black granite walls of the Memorial Court include the names of over 1,200 Americans of

Japanese ancestry who gave their lives in service to America. The Memorial Court is a tangible and poignant reminder to current and future generations of the enormity of the sacrifice these soldiers made.

Leading up to the Memorial Day weekend, The Memorial Court Alliance, also holds a Spit and Polish Day, during which young people are given the task of honoring those who passed by helping to clean the memorial. The young people power-wash the monument and then wipe them clean with miniature towels. Once

completed, they go up to a classroom in the JACCC to learn about the key events of different veterans' times in service. Participating in this year's Spit and Polish Day were members of Yonsei 31, whose members include VHBT members Leah Matsubayashi and Quinn Daimonji, and Megan Wada, granddaughter of Rev. George and Mrs. Kay Matsubayashi. Among the veterans who shared their stories was VHBT Temple member, Danny Nakagiri.
